<b>Name</b>	<b>Description</b>
Eileen M. Galloway	American legal scholar (1906-2009); helped write the 1958 National Aeronautics and Space Act.
Daniel Goedhuis	Dutch legal scholar (1905–1995); first professor appointed to teach air law (Leiden Law School, 1938); held chair in air law from 1947, extended to space law in 1961, until 1977.
Stephen Gorove	American professor of space law (1917-2001); Director of Space Studies and Policy, from 1991-1998, at the University of Mississippi; founded and chaired the editorial advisory board for the first space law journal, the <i>Journal of Space Law</i> , in 1973.
Andrew G. Haley	American lawyer and rocket propulsion entrepreneur (1904-1966); founder of Aerojet Engineering Corporation; was instrumental in founding both the International Academy of Astronautics and the International Institute of Space Law.
S. Neil Hosenball	American lawyer (1925-2009); general counsel of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (1975-1985).
Clarence Wilfred Jenks	British international lawyer (1909-1973); Director-General of the International Labour Organization (1970–1973); author of <i>Space Law</i> (1965).
Elena P. Kamenetskaya	Soviet/Russian specialist in space law (1949-1994).
Manfred Lachs	Polish diplomat and jurist (1914-1993); greatly influenced in the development of international law after the Second World War; the Manfred Lachs Space Law Moot Competition was named in his honour by the International Institute of Space Law.
Martin Menter	United States Air Force judge advocate (1915-2004); chair of the American Bar Association's Space Law Committee and the Aerospace Law Committee of the International and Comparative Law Section.
Eugene Pepin	French legal scholar (1887-1988); Director of the Institute for Air and Space Law (1955-1959); director of the International Institute of Space Law (1963-1973).
